HUMAN RIGHTS TRAINING

Kamoa–Kakula held its annual training on the Voluntary Principles on Security and Human Rights (VPSHRs), led by Justicia ASBL, a non-profit human rights, environmental and development organization. Around 1,500 security personnel, including Kamoa’s Risk Control team and both public and private security staff, took part in the program.



EXPLORING SKILLS FOR THE FUTURE

Sixty students from the Royale School's Fashion and Sewing section visited Kamoa's Chatuta Sewing Centre for a real-world industry experience. The students explored the sewing workshop, where they gained hands-on exposure to modern sewing and embroidery machines while learning about the role of technical sewing skills in supporting industries such as mining.



TEACHER'S DAY CELEBRATION

Kamoa-Kakula, together with IFS and ATS facility service providers, celebrated Teachers' Day at Kampemba Institute in the Kaponda village, honoring 175 teachers from community schools across the Kamoa footprint for their role in shaping the DRC's youth. The event reflected the 2026 theme, "Grandir Ensemble" ("Growing Together"), emphasizing the importance of partnerships in advancing education.



MALARIA AWARENESS

Kamoa-Kakula hosted a malaria awareness campaign across five surrounding communities to promote prevention and improve public health. The campaign educated community members on malaria transmission, symptoms, and practical measures to reduce the risk of infection. As part of the initiative, 1,193 women received mosquito nets, helping to protect vulnerable households and strengthen community resilience against malaria.



EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES THROUGH LITERACY

Kamoa-Kakula hosted an Adult Literacy Train the Trainers training program bringing together education staff, social affairs representatives, and community facilitators to equip them with skills to teach reading, writing and numeracy. Organized by Alfa Congo, the initiative equipped facilitators through the learner-centered ALFALIT methodology.



EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT (ECD) GRADUATION

The ECD year-end celebrations at Cite Mwilu, Walemba, Muvunda and Musokantanda marked a special milestone for young students preparing to transition to primary school. Through songs, presentations, and activities, the children showcased their learning and growth, proudly demonstrating their confidence and readiness for the next stage of their education.



EXPANDING ACCESS TO EDUCATION

Kampemba Technical Secondary Institute in Kaponda 1 village is the first community school to be designated and inaugurated as an official final-year DRC "*Examen d'Etat*" examination centre. The final examination session for the 195 candidates was launched on June 22nd. Previously, community candidates had to travel up to 100 kilometres to the nearest official centre for the examination week.



POWERING LOCAL ENTERPRISE

As part of its Economic Development Program, Kamoa supported the establishment of the Swift Tyre Centre, a community-owned enterprise under the leadership of the Chief of the Lufupa Sector. By financing the construction of the facility and providing the necessary equipment and tools, Kamoa has helped create a sustainable local business that offers tire repair and services for all types of vehicles.



JOINT FORUM ADVANCES SHARED VISION

The Platreef Mine convened its quarterly Joint Forum Steering Committee, bringing together community representatives, committee members, Trust and Board members, and other Company stakeholders to strengthen collaboration toward its 2029 vision. Discussions focused on developing a shared vision, mission, values, and stakeholder engagement framework.



PROVIDING DIGNITY AND CARE THROUGH HYGIENE CARE PACKS

As part of its ongoing Schools Support Program, the Platreef Mine donated hygiene care packs to Grade 12 learners attending matric winter camps at four local secondary schools. The initiative supported learners' health, well-being, and dignity while helping them focus on their preparation for the National Senior Certificate examinations.



ARTS FOR YOUTH

A youth-focused arts and skills development program has provided employment and learning opportunities to 300 young people from Mokopane and 20 surrounding communities. Implemented through a partnership between Platreef, the Bonega Communities Trust, and Assitej SA under the Social Employment Fund, the initiative places participants in schools and Early Childhood Development centres where they support learner development through creative arts activities.



PARTNERSHIP IN ACTION

Platreef, through its Transformation program, participated in the official launch of AMS Kodumela, a locally owned business established through a partnership between AMS Haden, local entrepreneurs, and community-based NGOs. The initiative, which began in 2024, aims to provide specialized mining solutions while promoting workplace safety, operational efficiency, and sustainable local economic development.



MALARIA PREVENTION

Kipushi conducted a malaria awareness campaign to protect employees and contractors during peak season, offering educational sessions on prevention and distributing insecticide-treated bed nets. The initiative aims to boost awareness and encourage healthy practices across the workforce.



WOMEN IN MINING

In celebration of International Women in Mining Day on June 15, the Kipushi Mine announced the launch of its Women in Mining Committee, reinforcing the Mine's commitment to advancing gender equality and supporting women in the workplace. The Committee will lead initiatives focused on skills development, health, safety and security, and the prevention of gender-based violence (GBV), while promoting an inclusive, supportive, and empowering environment for women across the operation.



SCHOOL DESK HANDOVER

The Kipushi Mine delivered the first batch of 100 school benches to Mwanga Primary School as part of a broader initiative to distribute 1,000 benches to ten schools across Kipushi. Part of the Mine's social responsibility program, this initiative will help create better , more comfortable learning environments for local students.



KAPONDA CHIEFDOM ROAD REHABILITATION LAUNCH

As part of its Cahier des Charges commitments, a five-year commitment to community development, Kipushi launched upgrades to a 7.5-kilometre road in the Kaponda Chiefdom to enhance connectivity and support local development. The project aims to improve access for residents, facilitate the movement of people and goods, and increase road safety, particularly during the rainy season.



BUILDING TOMORROW'S CLASSROOMS

As part of its five-year community development plan (Cahier des Charges), the Kipushi Mine has begun building new school facilities in Baya village in the Kaponda Chiefdom, bringing modern classrooms and better access to education for local students.
